

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


ALL ARE WELCOME HERE

MOUNTAIN VIEWS



FOREVER WILD

The Adirondack Park is a unique wilderness area that is larger than Yellowstone, Yosemite, Grand Canyon, Glacier, and the Great Smoky Mountain National Parks combined. The border of the park — called the "Blue Line" — surrounds over 6 million acres of privately and publicly owned land that is protected. There's no fee to enter and it never closes. In fact, it's home to more than 130,000 year-round residents.

For generations the Adirondacks have been a beloved vacation destination, a place where wilderness provides countless opportunities for adventure, exploration, and fun. In fact, it was because of the Adirondacks that the word vacation was created, when city dwellers would "vacate" the stifling city summers and escape to the cool, clean air of the wilderness. That legacy of scenic leisure endures, but the story of the Adirondacks could have gone much, much differently.

Human activity started thousands of years ago as rugged terrain and over 3,000 lakes and rivers were used by Native American peoples for hunting and fishing.

As English settlers moved into the region, they began harvesting the forests for its highly valuable pine. This continued until much of the Adirondacks was bare.


Clear-cutting became a growing concern for many in the late 1800s, and in 1894 the Adirondack Forest Preserve was established as a constitutionally protected Forever Wild area. Of the Adirondack Park's 6 million acres, 2.6 million acres are owned by New York state. The remaining 3.4 million acres are privately owned. The region's mix of public and private land allows for conservation and civilization to thrive.

Soon after the formation of the Adirondack Park, a new industry began — tourism. Great camps and lodges began to sprout up around mountain lakes. The mountains became a playground for the rich and famous. Names like Rockefeller, Roosevelt, and Coolidge pepper the records of visitors, as well as countless

authors, movie stars, and celebrities.

As more and more people experienced the Adirondacks, more and more people came. With the dawning of the age of the automobile, suddenly a trip to the Adirondacks wasn't just for the rich and famous. Activities like hiking, camping, paddling, and fishing exploded in popularity in the mid-twentieth century — and so did the Adirondacks. Even winter activities flourished here, making the Adirondacks a year-round recreation destination.

The Adirondacks are a powerful symbol for conservation and how nature can be both enjoyed and allowed to thrive. The mix of protected wilderness, welcoming communities, and travelers is unique. It's the responsibility of everyone to make sure that the rugged beauty of the Adirondacks is protected and treasured for future generations. Together, the small actions we all take can make a world of difference to keep the Adirondacks forever wild.



A SEASON OF RENEWAL


DISCOVER SOMETHING NEW

MID'S PARK

Don't miss a single second of fall's fiery display. Grab food to-go from one of the restaurants downtown or grab a hot beverage and sink into an Adirondack Chair at Mid's Park. Enjoy lakeside dining al-fresco style.

LAKE PLACID MARINA

Hand over the reins and prepare to sit in awe, as you cruise the pristine waters of Lake Placid Lake in an enclosed pontoon boat. You will see and hear about the stately manors and Great Camps nestled in between autumn's vibrant colors.

Whiteface Mountain adds to the spectacle and is a view wholly different from the water. A Lake Placid boat tour is a must for all visitors to the Adirondacks. It is truly a delightful experience.

OLYMPIC JUMPING COMPLEX

Enjoy summit views without the effort. Climb aboard for a short gondola ride, followed by a glass, enclosed elevator, which ends at an observation deck atop the 128-meter ski jumping tower. The panoramic vista of the Adirondack Mountains and village of Lake

Placid is all the more breathtaking with the glorious fall colors extending as far as the eye can see.

THE NOTCH

No trip to Lake Placid would be complete without driving through "The Notch." the section of Route 86 between Lake Placid and Wilmington. Windy roads hug the West Branch of the Ausable River with huge cliff faces towering overhead. If you're lucky, you


might spot a fisherman or even a moose at one of the small parking pull-offs, so don't forget to bring your camera.





Ride the Adirondack Rail Trail!

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Winters here will have you snow-bound all season! Create your perfect winter getaway in Lake Placid. Fill your days with nostalgic rides down the toboggan chute or skating out on the lake. Ski until your legs give out, and take in the mountain views as you recover on the streets of this incredible town. We love the cold months here, but preparing for the unique temperatures and weather forecasts is essential to making the most of your winter stay. Remember proper gear on your hikes, sled rides, and ski days to ensure plenty of winter fun all season long. So get out, explore, stay warm and make this winter perfect!

SKI THE SIGHTS!

Skiing, in all forms, is woven into the fabric of Lake Placid. Once the blanket of snow falls over the trails, the opportunities are endless. From gentle cross-country ski trails to steep slides down the epic Whiteface Mountain, the Adirondacks are a skier's dream, and Lake Placid is located right in the center of them! Ski through the rolling hills of the trail

systems surrounding town. Try your hand at the biathlon course. Test your skills on the iconic face of Whiteface Mountain, and wind down with some of our other incredible winter experiences.

TONIGHT, WE SKATE WITH THEM!

Motivational speeches aside, it's only fitting that the home of Miracle on Ice would be full of places to skate. Located in the heart of town. Mirror Lake offers outdoor, all-day, full-lake loops and skating on the open ice. Want to go fast? The historic Olympic Speed Skating Oval is just

across the way, offering rentals and skating under the lights! Be a part of the Olympic legacy! Ask about open skate hours at either the 1932 Jack Shea or 1980 Herb Brooks Olympic Arenas.

FUN ON MIRROR LAKE

Dog sled rides and toboggan slides might not be your first thought when you think of a day on the lake, but Mirror Lake is full of fun year round. Slide down the toboggan chute out onto the ice, or load up the dog sled and catch a ride around the lake. Tucked into the heart of town, Mirror Lake is one of the best places to create your perfect winter day.

A PERFECT MAIN STREET

Take a stroll down Lake Placid's charming Main Street. Unique shops filled with artisan crafts, clothes, outdoor gear, and snacks line the street. Stop in for a look, or sit by the fire for a cozy meal or drink. With historic Olympic sites and Adirondack Mountains as your backdrop, a walk through town can't get any better.





BEING PREPARED = HAVING MORE FUN

We know winter preparedness isn't exactly fun or glamorous and doesn't make for the greatest shots for the 'gram, but it makes a big difference in having fun!

Proper traction is essential to winter travel in the Adirondacks. In fact, skis or snowshoes are frequently required for any backcountry adventures in the winter months. The extra surface area on the snow will make your trip not only safer, but more fun as well! In snowy conditions, skis or snowshoes will prevent you from postholing, or sinking your feet deep into the snow, with every step. This makes moving on-trail safer, faster, and much more enjoyable for those that come after you.

For icier conditions, such as mountain summits, microspikes offer better traction than snowshoes or skis. They're small and packable, so be sure to throw them in your bag just in case.

esponsibl The word vacation originated in the Adirondacks. So did the word "hiking." Wait, that's not true. Maybe we can pretend for a moment. When you're standing amidst the natural beauty of the Adirondacks, it's not hard to imagine that this is where it all began. Picture this: mountains, lakes, rivers, valleys, meadows, ponds. HIKE SMARTER, NOT HARDER

The ever-popular 46 High Peaks tower above the horizon on the outskirts of town. Yes, the 46 High Peaks are special. We know them, we love them. But, truth be told, there are loads of adventurous hiking options to choose from, all

> memorable, and all brag-worthy! In fact, the best kept secrets in the Lake Placid hiking world are the lower elevation hikes. Many of these shorter, family-friendly hikes will bring you stunning panoramic views, and leave you with a new appreciation for the grandeur of the landscape (and also with plenty of energy left for added adventure throughout the rest of your day!) Don't worry, you'll encounter all of the same delights of the longer, steeper Adirondack trails, with all of the roots, mud, rocks, boulders and photo opportunities!

CHOOSE THE RIGHT HIKE

One of the most important rules of hiking (besides having fun) is to choose a hike that's right for you. While an extra long High Peaks hike with thousands of feet of elevation change might sound adventurous and thrilling, it may not be a realistic goal for you right now or for the beginning of your hiking season. Keep safety in mind and know your own limits before embarking on a hike. We highly recommend planning well, purchasing a guidebook, map and compass, and talking to local experts or guides. Summer can be a busy time at trailheads, and local experts can also help you plan for alternate hikes in case of unforeseen challenges like difficulties finding parking. Each hike offers something different, unique and satisfying.

LOVE YOUR ADK

Every hiker is encouraged to practice responsible recreation. Love Your ADK is a pledge, a commitment to support the messages and values of Leave No Trace. Millions of people visit the public lands inside the Adirondacks each year, many

> of them hikers. By pledging to Love Your ADK, you commit to protecting the lands, waters, and communities we all know and love. For hikers, that might mean staying on the trail to prevent further erosion to fragile landscapes, being mindful to watch wildlife from afar, or only sharing respectful, educating messages online. Remember, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Taking

steps to be a good steward of the land today, means that others will be able to enjoy Adirondack hiking trails for years to come.





In the Adirondacks and the Lake Placid area in particular, hiking is a beautiful, fulfilling activity that many people enjoy. Because this is a popular activity, especially on weekends, parking lots at and near trailheads can fill up quickly and roadside parking is not permitted in many areas.

To help mitigate the crush during peak seasons, take a hiker shuttle! A shuttle route offers easy access to some of the most popular trailheads in the High Peaks region. Please note that while there may be a fee for riding the shuttle, the peace of mind of not having to find parking is priceless! ALPINE SKIING

Whiteface Mountain's peak creates an iconic silhouette against the sky over Lake Placid. Take the short scenic drive yourself or catch the free shuttle from town. This Olympic mountain is a skiing and snowboarding paradise. Boasting 3,430 feet of vertical drop, Whiteface has the greatest in the east. 25 miles of terrain spread across 90 trails and three peaks.

Beginners will be happy to know that there's plenty of fun terrain and experts will be thrilled by the steeps, slides, glades, and terrain parks. Add in the cozy gondola, plenty of slopeside amenities, and the best scenery imaginable, and you've got yourself a world-class ski destination.

We want everyone to get

to experience skiing in the Adirondacks. That's why the Bear Den section of the mountain is dedicated to learning and improving your skills in the safest way possible. Professional instructors, its own lodge,

beginner-friendly chairlifts, and a magic carpet make Bear Den the perfect place for first timers and newcomers to the sport.

GLADES

Whiteface has its share of tree skiing at every pitch. From the lowangle, open trees at Hoot Owl, to the steeper pockets of fresh snow at Slide View, skiers and boarders

of any level can find something to enjoy.

Skiing the East Coast trees is a great way to add a little adventure to your lap, but be sure not to overstep your skill level.

THE SLIDES

Whiteface Mountain offers the only liftaccessible, offpiste skiing on the East Coast. These natural

backcountry lines are the proudest on the mountain! Opened under ski patrol's discretion, this expert-only terrain is a unique experience for skiers and riders with the skills to drop in.

TERRAIN PARKS

Here for the features? Whiteface has plenty of parks filled with jumps and rails of various sizes, depending on your skill level. Start small in the Flying Squirrel park, and head to Broadway and Brookeside when you're ready to take your tricks up a notch.

APRÈS-SKI

The good times don't stop when the skis hit the rack! Whiteface offers tons of amazing slopeside pit stops to refuel and get you ready for the next lap. Find yourself craving a mid-run snack? Stop by the Legacy Lodge for food, drinks, and a

place to sit while you take in the views.





Want to get the most out of this lift ride? Whiteface Mountain's longest run, the Wilmington Trail, can give you just that.

With 2.1 miles of sweeping turns and mountain vistas, this run is a local favorite from the top of Lookout Mountain.

Starting below the summit of Whiteface itself, the Lookout Mountain Chair has spectacular views of the snow-capped peaks and the distant Lake Champlain. After a few turns on this stellar, intermediate trail, the sky opens up to the gorgeous Adirondack High Peaks. Ski this winding run over several mellow headwalls, through a moderate narrow section, and down to the base to jump back on the lift and get out for more!

This run is great for fresh groomers in the early morning, or for weekdays with the trail all to yourself.

on a newly created, sustainably designed trail that's great for hikers and even better for the mountain.

In winter, Nordic skiing once again takes center stage and it's been kicked up a notch. 55km of trails, ranging from comfortably easy to "so you want to be an Olympian?" levels of challenging fun. Non-skiers can still get in on the snowy fun — Van Ho now has snowmaking, too! — with snowshoe trails and rentals, so there's no excuse to miss out.

At Mt. Van Hoevenberg, the speedy fun isn't just on two wheels, it's on runners, too! Create your own Olympics with the bobsled and skeleton experiences, where you'll ride down a real sliding track with a trained pro! You can also observe world-class and local athletes practice and compete in some of the fastest, iciest adventures you'll ever see.

The newest treat is the Cliffside Coaster, the longest mountain coaster in the USA. The track follows the 1980 Olympic bobsled track, has amazing views, and with you in control, your ride can be as zippy or leisurely as you like. Exhilarating and family-friendly, it's a unique ride!

When you're ready to rest up, warm up, and shop for the latest gear and Olympic souvenirs, the Mountain Pass Lodge has all that you need, and more, including the only Swix concept store in North America. It's also a great base camp for events, such as cross-country ski races and World Cup luge, bobsled, and skeleton races that prep and decide future Olympians!

OLYMPIC JUMPING COMPLEX

Part of the magic of the Olympic Winter Games and its sports is the sheer daring and awesome skill required. Perhaps none of these sports is more astonishing than ski jumping and now, you can get some idea of just how high and how fast these elite athletes go!

The Olympic Jumping Complex, in addition to hosting competitions, lets visitors experience epic views just like a ski jumper. Year-round, glide up the hill on the SkyRide, a pulse gondola with sweet views that brings you up the jumping hill to the glass enclosed elevator at the 128-meter jump tower. Your ski jump adventure is far from over, however! Let the elevator whisk you to the observation deck, where panoramic, 360-degree

views of the Adirondacks await! Return to the base by gondola or, in the summer, accelerate

MT. VAN HOEVENBERG

Site of Nordic and sliding events at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games, Mt. Van Hoevenberg remains an outdoor adventure destination in all seasons.

In the sunshine of spring, summer, and fall, mountain bikers go with the flow on a trail system that offers more than 30km of great riding amid pine forests and mountain views. Beginner or expert, the perfect trail for you to have fun and

improve your skills is right here. Didn't bring a bike? No problem; they have rentals!

If mountain biking isn't your thing, but great views are, then check out the hiking trail that takes you up the mountain. East Trail offers an energetic hike with a 4.7 mile round trip adventure



your descent by way of the zipline! The zipline is the best way for you to feel what the ski jumpers experience as they zoom down the hill!

Be sure to keep your eyes peeled for athletes in training, including the dizzying skills of aerialists!

WHITEFACE MOUNTAIN

> The Olympic Center isn't just about the past, it's about the present and the future! The 1932 and 1980 rinks, home to historic Olympic moments such as the 1980 US defeat of the Soviet hockey team, and the gold medal-winning wonders of figure skater Sonja Henie in 1932, have been kept in world-class shape and host athletic events big and small. Hockey tournaments here are the norm. from collegiate championships to peewee hockey, maintaining the spirit of

hockey magic in Lake Placid. You don't have to be a champion skater yourself to enjoy the rinks here. Take a tour to learn more about the history or enjoy public skating hours. The only requirement is that vou have fun!

Just off Main Street, with views of the High Peaks in the distance and the comforts of dining, shopping, and lodging just steps away, the Olympic Oval is one of the best outdoor rinks you'll ever encounter. Created for the 1932 Olympics, the rink has been modernized, hosted the 1980 Winter Olympic speedskating events, and is a beloved spot for public skating. Families, couples, and adventurous



snowboarding paradise (and if not, check out our section on alpine skiing!), but did you know that year round it's a remarkable, easily accessible destination?

Thanks to the Whiteface Veterans' Memorial Highway, the summit of the fifth-highest peak in the state is accessible to all! Cruise up the winding, 5-mile road as amazing views of the Adirondacks unfold around you. At the top, a stone castle awaits with amenities, while the rocky summit may be reached by an elevator or a short scenic hike. The views, which on clear days can reach Vermont and Canada, are something you'll never Looking to put a little effort into vour trip to the mountain? No problem! Experienced hikers and snowshoers will love the trails, which offer challenges and extraordinary views. At roughly 12 miles round-trip it's a big adventure with some rugged terrain, so please only undertake this if you're an experienced hiker. No matter how you visit the mountain, we want you to have fun and be safe!

OLYMPIC CENTER

While you're downtown, be sure to visit the Olympic Center, the heart of the 1932 and 1980 Olympic Winter Games. If you want to immerse yourself in Olympic

MOUNTAIN BIKING



COME PLAY IN THE DIRT!

The Adirondack Mountains are famous for skiing and hiking, but the region is becoming increasingly known for awesome mountain biking. Away from the frequented hiking paths and skiing slopes exist trails quietly traveled on two wheels (or skis and snowshoes in the winter). In Lake Placid, we take mountain sports seriously, and we've been working hard on creating and expanding topnotch mountain biking trails that are suitable and immensely fun for beginner and expert riders alike. This region is now one giant mountain biking playground waiting to be explored! We are spoiled rotten with our trail networks seemingly endless, rugged, twisting and turning trails allowing us to ride as little or as much as we would like, typically without moving our cars thanks to their close proximity to town and to one another. Mountain bikers can stay and play in one fun-filled network, or connect surrounding trail systems for an epic day of riding.

MEET THE BETA CREW

The mountain bike trails of Lake Placid are a local labor of love, the majority of them being built and maintained by a volunteerbased organization known as the Barkeater Trails Alliance (BETA). BETA organizes numerous trail building days throughout the warmer seasons with volunteers collectively putting in thousands of hours of labor. Even more work goes on behind-the-scenes with volunteers consistently maintaining trails as different maintenance needs arise. With so much TLC going into the trails, the incredible scenery afforded each and every ride, and the variety of terrain offered at every turn, it's easy to see why the mountain biking culture in the Adirondacks has continually grown from year to year with no end in sight. The continued

advocacy from their group within the context of continued growth, "Ride With Gratitude," provides the community and visitors with a stewardship-oriented mindset that will only serve to protect the land we recreate on. Find yourself riding at Logger's Loop's or Lussi Trails in Lake Placid, and you'll see BETA's efforts first-hand.

SO MUCH TO RIDE

New to mountain biking? The trails at Mount Van Hoevenberg, Henry's Woods, and Heaven Hill are a perfect place for any beginner to put their wheels down and see what all the fuss is about. For more seasoned riders who love riding technical trails and wooden features, the Lussi and Logger Trails offer Lake Placid's highest concentration of single track. In the mood for a mixture of berms. rocks, roots, climbs and descents? The Craig Wood and Scott's Cobble Trails were built on the side of an old ski hill abandoned in the 1970s, and they are awaiting your arrival.

No bike? No problem! You can rent everything you need from one of our local gear shops. Be sure to ask the staff about trail conditions and recommendations before heading

JUST A HOP, SKIP, AND A PEDAL AWAY

The best part of all: all trails are close to town, allowing your perfect day in Lake Placid to have endless possibilities! Fuel up before or after a ride with a bite (and a pint) at one of the many restaurants around town,

peruse our local shops, or enjoy some live music.





CRAIG WOOD + SCOTT'S COBBLE

Construction of this fast and "flow-y" network of trails began in the summer of 2012 and is still ongoing. While flat sections are hard to come by in Craig Wood, the fun comes at every turn.

Riders will see the influence of the Craig Wood Trails being located adjacent to the Craig Wood Golf Course, with trail names such as "19th Hole," "Back Nine," "Putt Putt," and "Duffers Delight" appearing throughout the network. As you enjoy the trails, please be sure to avoid riding your bike on or through the golf course except when you have to connect to Poppa Wheelie from the clubhouse parking lot.

If you're in the mood to climb, a trip up to the top of Scott's Cobble — a trail directly adjacent to Craig Wood — will certainly wake up your legs. But what goes up must come down. Your climb will earn you a fast, flowy, berm-filled descent that is a must-do upon every visit to Craig Wood. Another great descent involves climbing Back Nine before another fun, flowy, fast descent through 19th Hole.



The beauty of cross-country skiing in the Lake Placid area is that there are enough trails to keep you skiing throughout the winter, and enough variations in terrain that you'll never be bored. From groomed cross-country ski centers to untouched backcountry thrills, the Nordic skiing here is incredible, and it's one of the best ways to experience winter in Lake Placid.

Our groomed trail networks make getting out a snap, and warmth and food are never far. Cross-country ski centers are also great places to try skiing, rent equipment, get some pointers from the staff, and master the basics on wide, well maintained paths.

OLYMPIC DREAMS

Within minutes from downtown, you'll find groomed trails at Mount Van Hoevenberg, where you can cross-country ski on the same trails as Olympians, and at Cascade X-C Ski Center (now owned by Adirondack Mountain Club). Seasoned skiers and those new to the sport will appreciate the services and amenities, variety of well-maintained trails, and tasty après ski hot cocoa offered at both ski centers! The new Scotts Cobble Nordic Center features groomed trails on a lit trail network for magical night skiing with motion-detector lights. More advanced skiers may opt to blaze

their own trail down an exciting backcountry route, or enjoy a classic tour like the Jackrabbit Trail or Avalanche Pass.


EXPLORE MORE

Groomed ski centers are great.
You can learn, refine skills, and still explore. But when you're ready to take your skis into the backcountry, there are some good options around Lake Placid that shouldn't be missed! Even beginner and novice skiers will delight in knowing incredible trails are close to town and close to nature. Trail networks like those at Heaven Hill, Henry's Woods, and the Brewster Peninsula Trails are mellow and perfect for families and even more intrepid explorers seeking rolling hills.

With so much good skiing in and around Lake Placid, it's possible to make an entire winter out of cross-country skiing. So, grab your skis, poles, and maybe a mug of hot chocolate and hit the trails this winter! Inside the Lake Placid snowglobe, there are always new Nordic ski adventures to be had.





Dating back to pre-WWII times, Wini's family owned a bed & breakfast in Balderschwang, Germany. It comes naturally, as a majority of the family actually works at these establishments, and take pride in doing so as part of their heritage.

Leaders in the community, for decades the family has provided input, support, and knowledge to several boards they've been a part of, in addition to keeping their business a Lake Placid staple. Stefanie played a crucial role in bringing the 1980 Olympic Winter Games to our village, advocating for the bid, and traveling to Austria as our representative to the International Olympic Committee. Following the Games, she trail-blazed the advocacy of maintaining our Olympic facilities for continued use, and worked on bringing tour groups in for the benefit of all businesses.

Woven into the family's legacy of lifting up businesses and championing Lake Placid as a world-class destination, is a sustainability-minded

approach to everything they work on. Being located adjacent to Mirror Lake, they've made improvements to benefit the environment that include green roofs, better stormwater management, and a limestone beach that counteracts the effects of acid rain. Through the Holderied Family Community Fund, they've helped research efforts on salt use in the community.

As the enterprising and communityfocused Holderied family continues to grow, so will Lake Placid. Their "Golden" legacy is evident in all they do, and we're excited to see what's next as they help write another chapter of our Olympics village's history.





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












WHAT'S IN A NAME?

That lake you can see from Main Street isn't actually Lake Placid. It's a beautiful body of water called Mirror Lake. And if you happen to be there on a calm day, it's easy to see how it got its name. Mirror Lake is more than just a pretty face. It's at the very heart of what makes Lake Placid so special.

Mirror Lake isn't all that big, especially when compared to Lake Placid, which is a mere stone's throw away. At about 1 mile long and 60 feet deep, you can walk around it in under an hour following Main Street and Mirror Lake Drive. But this little lake is the heart of downtown recreation. Lake Placid Public Beach is popular with families in the hot summer days. It's staffed by lifeguards and has a bathhouse with changing rooms and restrooms. It's common to see craft of all sorts floating out on the calm waters. Canoes, kayaks, stand up paddleboards, and small sail boats dot the clear waters. There are no motors allowed, so paddlers don't have to worry about wakes and fast-moving boats. Also in the summer you can find triathletes swimming the famed Ironman course as they prepare for the big race.

FROZEN FUN

The fun doesn't stop when the lake freezes over. In the winter the village clears a skating path around the lake, as well as several hockey rinks. Pond hockey tournaments are held out on the ice. There's a toboggan ride that shoots riders across the frozen lake and you can even take a ride on a dog sled.

THE SOUND OF MUSIC

In the summer, the Songs at Mirror Lake concert series holds free concerts every Tuesday evening

at the Dr. Paul White Memorial Band Shell in Mid's Park. You can even enjoy the concerts while floating on the lake! The band shell is also home to weekly Wednesday concerts by the Lake Placid Sinfonietta.
